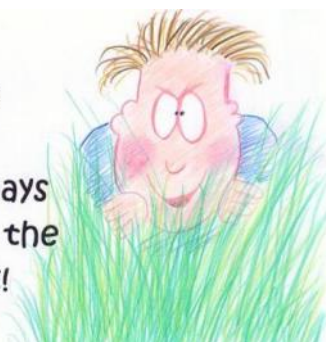

The Memorable Teacher (cont.)

... cared about two things. Firstly, the teacher cared for the students in the class and secondly, the teacher cared about the piece of history he/ she was sharing. If you have a passion for what you are teaching and you care for those you are teaching, then you will have a great foundation for being a memorable teacher.



This is also true for the Christian Education teacher - care for the kids and a passion for the gospel message.

How do I care for kids?

- * Show an interest in their interests (sport, music, hobbies, family, etc).
- * Remember next week what they told you the previous week, and mention it again to them. (*Is your dog getting better after your dad took it to the vet?*)
- * Ask them questions and then get them to talk about their recent experiences. This will show them that you are taking an interest in them. (*How did your team go at basketball yesterday? Tell me a bit more about your game.*)
- * Let the child know that you have been praying for them. (*I prayed about the problem you're having at school that you told me about. How are things going there?*)
- * Send a card, email or make a phone call if a child is absent or sick.
- * Just a simple hi-five or a "good to see you again, Kim" comment indicates you are showing an interest in that child.

How do I express a passion for the message?

- * Don't overdo it! Nobody likes an over-zealous, over-bearing person. But they will admire someone who speaks enthusiastically and genuinely about their faith.
- * Don't be embarrassed to actually say that you love Jesus. Don't say it in a gushy way but in a genuine, sincere way.
- * Every so often mention how God impacts your everyday life - today! Share what you've learnt from your Bible readings.
- * Tell stories of how you had to make choices when you were a child. Don't be embarrassed about sharing some of the poor choices you made (within reason) as well as the smart/ good choices.

Twenty years from now, your students may not remember the items in your lesson plan, but they will remember the joy you expressed in seeing them and the passion and love you had for following Jesus. Remember that the facts about Christianity are very important and we must do our best to share the facts faithfully, creatively and in an interesting way. However what your students will remember in the future is whether you cared for them and if you really believed passionately in your message even to the point of sharing how it affects your life, your attitudes and the way you treat people.

Recruiting to fit specific jobs

Here's what we've learned about recruiting that may help you find people you may never have thought of before - to serve behind the scenes. Keep your eyes open for people's hidden gifts and interests.



- **Camera-Toting Dad** -- You know that father who always has his camera out for his kids' performances? He'd make a great photographer for your publicity items, bulletin boards, and PowerPoint presentations.
- **Computer Whiz** -- Ever had a mum who complains about her teenage boy spending too much time with his multimedia toys? He'd make a great techie for you. He may even teach you how to do PowerPoints.
- **Divine Designers** -- The women who love to decorate their homes would make a great team to spruce up your large group area with signs, banners, props, and more.
- **Happy Chappies** -- You know these folks. They always have a smile and are eager to shake your hand. They're your next greeters, of course!
- **Filers, Not Pilers** -- It's the people who love to shop, organize, and get together with like-minded people who'll make a great behind-the-scenes supply-gathering team for your program.

When people serve in an area of interest that energizes and fulfills them, they're much more likely to sign on for the adventure. We've heard it again and again from kids min leaders: *"This program brought out people's talents in wonderful new ways! People who never imagined that they could work with kids had a great time -- and they were even willing to sign up for kids events throughout the year."*

So go for it! Look beyond "the usual suspects" of volunteers, and bring in some new faces. You'll find that as you begin asking people to fill smaller, more specific roles, folks will come out of the woodwork.
